Commemorating the Centenary of Harrogate's War Memorial


Lynne Mee writes on behalf of the War Memorial Centenary Project Group, which includes representatives of the Civic Society.

This year marks 100 years since Harrogate's war memorial was unveiled by Henry Lascelles, 6th Earl of Harewood on 1 September 1923 in a ceremony apparently witnessed by 10,000 spectators. The memorial has stood in Prospect Square for nearly a century proudly recording the names of 1163 local men and women who lost their lives in two world wars. To mark this milestone, a project has been launched to match those names with their stories.

The War Memorial Centenary Project Group, which started planning in January, is chaired by HCS member Nigel McClea. He added 'We have an amazing group of volunteers from a number of local groups and organisations who have in my opinion put together a magnificent programme of events. This will not only help to make sure our war dead are never forgotten but also help us learn more about the war memorial's structure plus its social history and its importance to Harrogate.'



The centenary centrepiece is a free multi-media immersive exhibition '*More than a name on a Memorial*' being staged in the magnificent historic surroundings of West Park United Reformed Church (URC). It is being designed and constructed by local historian Terry-Mike Williams who was responsible for the recent highly successful *The Story of Harrogate's Railways.* The

exhibition also draws on the herculean efforts of another local historian Graham Roberts. All 1163 names have been researched by Graham and much has been discovered and recorded. This includes military units, war records, photographs, cause of death, date of death and place of burial, although more than 300 of the First World War names inscribed have no known grave. This ongoing research will form the core of the exhibition.

The Project Group would value our active support in spreading the word of all that is happening to commemorate the War Memorial centenary. An eight page illustrated programme and details of the exhibition and how to book for the ancillary events is available at thecenotaphcentenary.info

Heritage Open Days: 8 - 17 September 2023

Kevin Hales, a member of our Events Group responsible for organising Harrogate's Heritage Open Days events, writes:

Harrogate will once again be playing a prominent role in the national **Heritage Open Days** (HODs) festival, which runs this year from **Friday 8 to Sunday 17 September**.

Preparations are in full swing, and the **Harrogate Civic Society** has been working with many different heritage sites, organisations and religious establishments in the town, along with local heritage enthusiasts, to build a varied and interesting series of events. Twenty are already registered.

Highlights to date include: Ogden of Harrogate, welcoming visitors to an exhibition and talk at its James Street premises, and new heritage walks led by local experts in each of Pannal, Ripley Village, and Valley Gardens. We are proud to include in our HODs programme, for local residents and visitors from far and wide to attend, two important talks that form part of the town's extensive **War Memorial Centenary** commemorations programme.

There will once again be events at the Harrogate Club and at the Library, also in Bilton and New Park and at several of Harrogate's most impressive churches along with guided walks around the Heritage Plaques <u>harrogateplaques.org</u> and through the Duchy estate. For those who wish to explore a cemetery, or admire local art, there will be something for them and anyone who's keen on climbing towers will have two (so far) to choose from.

Other events are in the pipeline and key details will be in a timetable guide on the Civic Society website *(see box below).* The fullest and most up-to-date details of all HODs events across England will, as usual, be on the national website

heritageopendays.org.uk/. To find out about those in Harrogate town and nearby just type **Harrogate** into the **Keywords** searchbox and all will be revealed.

Some organisers need and welcome support on the day from Civic Society members, and lending a hand is a great way for us to show our appreciation to Harrogate's heritage ambassadors who open up their sites and buildings or give talks or walks - all for free and who therefore make HODs such a successful festival here.

Lastly, a date for your diaries. Sarah Holloway, the national programme manager of Heritage Open Days, coordinated by the National Trust, has kindly offered to visit Harrogate to give a special talk and presentation to Civic Society members on the evening of Wednesday 22 November. We expect the venue will be West Park United Reformed Church, itself an important heritage building, and we will be welcoming the local National Trust association's members to attend, along with all organisers of HODs events in Harrogate this September. Full details will be on the HCS website later.

The Harrogate Stray - Shoud it be Registered as Common Land?

On 6 June, North Yorkshire Council gave notice of an application by the Open Spaces Society to register the Harrogate Stray under the Commons Act 2006.

The Civic Society has submitted an objection to this application, and **Henry Pankhust** summarises the situation below:

Many of you will be aware that the Stray is protected by a Local Act of Parliament – the Harrogate Stray Act 1985.

This Act was successfully passed with considerable effort and input from the Harrogate Civic Society (then the Harrogate Society) and co-operation with Harrogate Borough Council. A lot of the work was done by our sorely missed committee member lan Brown.

The Stray is probably the most valued asset in our town. No local resident would want to see it come to any harm or be reduced. This was evident in 2016/2017 when the Council issued a consultation to gain the public's views on use of the Stray. This arose when the Council considered changing the Stray Act to allow greater flexibility in its use. Was the Act too strict?

The consultation had a series of sensible questions, the answers from the public providing a resounding NO to any changes in the carefully drawn Act.

You may have seen notices around the Stray recently and wondered what they meant. A worrying situation has arisen. The Open Spaces Society (OSS) is intent on bringing the Stray within the Commons Registration Act 2006.

The Stray was previously exempted from the 1965 Commons Act, due to its protection under our Local Stray Act. An area of 200 acres had in effect been designated Common Land since 1770, although the exact boundary was not finalised until 1778. The 2006 Commons Act made it possible to reverse exemptions arising from the 1965 Commons Act.

We do not favour having two Acts of Parliament protecting the Stray, as it would provide no additional protection, but more likely cause confusion. Although there may have been occasional differences of opinion in interpreting the Stray Act, imagine the potential confusion caused by having TWO Acts. I doubt that North Yorkshire Council would relish having time consuming and expensive legal problems to resolve! If the Commons Act also applied, would the Stray Act rules remain as strong?

There are small differences between the official Duchy of Lancaster Stray map and the maps provided by the OSS. The Stray map cannot be changed even if exchange land is required due to road and footpath building etc.

So we have sent an objection to the Commons Registration officer at North Yorkshire Council. Confusion must be avoided!

Several areas of land beyond the well known '200 acres' are designated as Stray Land, including Swan Road (below right) and Otley Road verges north-east of Cold Bath Road (below left).





Visit to Grove Road Cemetery: Sunday 11 June

On what was a very warm June day, a group of around twenty-five members and guests were given a guided walk around Grove Road Cemetery. Paul Jennings writes:

My guided walk was inspired by Malcolm Neesam's researches, supplemented with my own work on the burial registers from 1864 to 1920.

The Cemetery was opened in 1864 in what was then a largely unbuilt area, after concern that the existing one at Christ Church was becoming overcrowded. The very first burial was of a seven-year-old girl. Sadly, infants and small children made up a large proportion of those interred over the years.

After looking at the white marble memorial to the First World War dead of Bilton, recently restored and relocated from the Methodist Chapel opposite the Cemetery, we then visited a wide variety of graves. These included some of the town's most influential citizens, like Richard Ellis and George Dawson, both builders responsible for some of Harrogate's loveliest developments and others who made their mark, like the historian William Grainge or John Farrah of the toffee business.

We also took in less well-known figures, some of whom reflected Harrogate's attraction to people from other lands, like the ex-slave Thomas Rutling of Tennessee, who made his home here after touring Europe with the famous Fisk University Jubilee Singers, German band leader Otto Schwarz who collapsed and died at the station and the Italian Crolla family who similarly entertained with their barrel organ.

The dead of two world wars are also represented and we saw several Commonwealth War Graves and a monument to Donald Bell, who won the Victoria Cross and whilst buried in France is remembered in Harrogate. Also Alfred Bruce, a former pupil of Harrogate Grammar School who drowned along with five other soldiers on a training exercise preparing to cross canals in Belgium and France. He is buried here in a quiet shaded corner.

To date there have been over 12,000 interments and there are over 5,000 graves. Burials still take place here, but infrequently. The former cemetery lodge is now a private house.

There is so much to see and learn in old graveyards and cemeteries and an incredible variety of styles of monument and many of course who have no monument at all. As they were originally intended, not just as places to bury the dead, but for the living to walk in, to remember and to reflect, so we can do the same today.
